In order to secure the support of the State Vocational Training Department at least ten business people must register, and any number from ten to fourteen is recommended by the State. In order to help the returned soldiers, the United States Government established schools of training to give them the background necessary to every success ful business career. It worked so well that it was extended to the schools and to the working classes.

Those persons of the city who have desired a commerical course, but who have been unable, for any reason, to take one, are requested to get in touch with A. H. Jarratt, principal of the high school at once. After the full class has been arranged it will be necessary to complete negotiations with George Coggins, State Supervisor of Vocational Training. It is hoped that everything will be ready within another week or two to announce the opening date.
