BAD WRECK ON SOUTH-**ERN NEAR HENDERSON**

Henderson, June 3.-A mixed train on the Southern Railroad met a disastrous if not fatal wreck this afternoon on the ouskirts of this city just after it had well cleared for spent a few hour Sunday night the yards on its outgoing trip for at Sam Inscore. Oxford. The engine left the rails Mr. and Mrs at a public road crossing just west of the limits, plunged down into the side ditch, rolled over on its left side and slid forward in the mud some 20 yards or more. The tender was thrown squarely across the track, torn entirely from its trucks and turned over on its side. The cab of the engine was torn completely off and into kindling wood, The front freight box was torn from its trucks and burled into the ditch on the opposite side of the track from the engine. Altogether it was a fearful looking lot of wreckage.

The track was completely torn up for several yards and the rails were twisted into all sorts of shapes, From about this mass of wreckage son, Engineer J. D. Tyler was picked up a very seriously it not fatally injur-

He had evidently been hurled from his seat to the ground with force and it is feared he sustained serious internal injuries the extent of which could not be ascertained before he was hurried off on a fast Seaboard train for a Richmond hospital, being accompanied by Mrs. Tyler and Dr. B.
