In the absence of Chairman J. Ennis Davis, Mr. B. I. Breedlove acted as temporary Chairman.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Chairman J. Ennis Davis, came in late and took his seat as Chairman.

J. W. Morton, was granted rebate \$4875.00 (Walnut Grove Township).

Mrs. A. C. Parham was allowed to list a parcel of land in Walnut Grove at single rate.

Miss Jennie Wagstaff was placed on outside pauper list at \$2.00 per month payable J. L. Rogers, Creedmoor, N. C.

H. P. Estes' Sallie L. Estes and R. L. Jackson were granted rebate of the 25 per cent charged on account of listing late.

D. Whorton, (col) was granted rebate of 25 per cent charged for failure to list taxes at proper time.

Martha Hobgood Outside Pauper amount increased to \$2.00 per month from March 1, 1919.

## RURAL CARRIER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service has announced an examination for the County of Granville, North Carolina, to be held at Oxford on April 12, 1919 to fill the position of rural carrier at Creedmoor and vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above mentioned county. The examination will be open only to male citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. This form and application blanks may be obtained from the offices mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practicable date.

The motion to machine and put in fills on road from Creedmoor to Ledge Rock Creek carried, the work to be done when they complete the fill at Roberson Creek bridge.

Messrs. J. T. Avesett, J. Ennis Davis, S. M. Wheeler and R. A. Jones, were appointed a committee to see if you can get a road and bridge between Cannadys bridge and Lyons bridge and report their findings to the Board at their regular meeting first Monday in April.

The motion to rescind the order passed at the February meeting discontinuing the road from Dorseys to Vance County line by way of T. V. Bobbitts carried and the Clerk was ordered to publish notice that the matter will take up at the April meeting.

J. T. Averett, B. I. Breedlove and W. E. Cannady were appointed a committee to look over the road from Dorseys to Vance County line by T. V. Bobbitts and report at April meeting.

W. B. Ballou, W. Z. Mitchell, B. E. Parham, W. H. Fleming, B. W. Parham, and John Webb were appointed a committee to secure the right of way and soil for the road from Oxford to Vance County Line.

Moved and second that the gray mule sold by the County and bought in by Mr. Vaden be and she be sold to W. E. Cannady at the sum of \$85.00. He having authorized Mr. Vaden to bid in the mule.

The County Attorney and Clerk were appointed a committee to receive the report of the committee appointed to interview the land owners relative to the right of way for the new Oxford and Roberson road and if they think desirable to sign the resolution of the Board same to the state Highway Department.

Chairman J. Ennis Davis and R. A. Jones reported that as requested by the Board, they sold three of the County mules for \$416.00.

No further business the Board adjourned subject to call of Chairman.

## GRANVILLE HOSIERY MILLS CO.

The committee appointed to select the name for the new hosiery mill, selected the name "Granville Hosiery Mills Co" this was submitted by Mr. S. H. Kieth. The next day the same name was mailed in by Miss Clegg, but as her name came in after the mill was named, the judges awarded the first dozen hose made by the new mill to Mr. S. H. Kieth.

The Secretary of State issued a charter last week, with an authorized capital of \$50,000.00. There has been around \$9000.00 of the stock subscribed.

It is a good idea of the promoters to have a mill that puts out as good hosiery as any in the state, and the present plan is to start with about one hundred knitting machines, and the battery of loopers, ribbers, sewing machines and finishing machinery required to operate a mill of the above size.

An option on a suitable brick building has already been secured, and all that remains to be done before Creedmoor enters the textile world is for a little more stock to be subscribed for.

Every man and woman in the community that can possibly do so would do well to buy some of the stock.

An organization meeting will be held Friday evening at eight o'clock in the Masonic Hall, to hear the report of the stock solicitors, to adopt the by-laws and elect the directors of the mill. Every man and woman interested in the welfare of our little town expected to be present. Come and show your colors.

## LIEUTENANTS H. B. HESTER MAKES GOOD IN FRANCE

We are glad to know that 1st Lieutenant Hugh B. Hester, son of our neighbor and friend Wm. A. Hester, of Hester, and brother of Jno. W. Hester, of Oxford, has given a good account of himself in the world war. Lieutenant Hester volunteered upon the declaration of war against Germany, leaving his studies at the University for the first officers training school at Oglethorpe Ga., from which he was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant on August 15, 1917. He went immediately to France with the first contingent of officers sent from the various training camps throughout the country, arriving in France in early October 1917. It has been actual service with him from the beginning, as he has seen the Expeditionary Army grow from 25,000 to over 2,000,000. On March 25, 1918 he was assigned to 2nd division of the old army outfit, with which he served at Chateau Thierry, Soissons, Champagne, St. Mehl, Argonne Muse and is now with it in the army of occupation. He has the record, we are informed, of having been with his battalion every day that it has been at the front and three days in addition when he was left to turn over their sector to the relieving unit. On July 21 he had his horse shot out from under him and killed and on October 19 a shell hit the building in which he was billeted, killing his "bunkie" within five feet of him and seriously wounding another in the adjoining room, though he was not injured.

Recent Lieutenant Hester forwarded to his father a cross of war that was awarded him by General Legium, commanding officer, and presented by General Neville, both distinguished French generals, for service in adjusting artillery fire upon a company of German's forming for attack in the open. The fire was adjusted so completely that the company was practically annihilated, leaving only a few stragglers. Lieutenant Hester says that he will be glad to be called upon to render such service. For services in the Argonne drive he was recommended for the Distinguished Service Medal, though he says that he is not expecting such distinction, as it is but seldom awarded.

In February Lieut. Hester was granted his first furlough since Christmas 1917 which time he spent in Southern France and Italy sight-seeing. He has no idea as to when he will get home, saying that he is likely to be among the last to leave, as he is with an old outfit, the regular army, and the regulars, he thinks, will have to remain until the last. He has seen but very few men from this state, and he is with a division that is but seldom mentioned in the southern papers, but the 2nd division, he says, has a fighting record the equal of any, of which he naturally is very proud. But he disclaims any candidacy for credit of having won the war, saying that his record of hardships and achievements is zero as compared with many that he knew.
