If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals, the publisher may con-tinue to send them until all arrearages are paid.
If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals from the office to which they are directed, they are responsible until they have settled their bills and ordered them dis-continued.

are sent to the former addresses, they are held responsible. 5 Any person who receives a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, is held in haw to be a subscriber. 6. If subscribers pay in advance, they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their time, if they do not wish to con-tinue taking the paper, otherwise the publish-er is authorized to send it on, and the sub-scriber will be responsible until express no-tice with payment of all arrears, is sent to the publisher.






