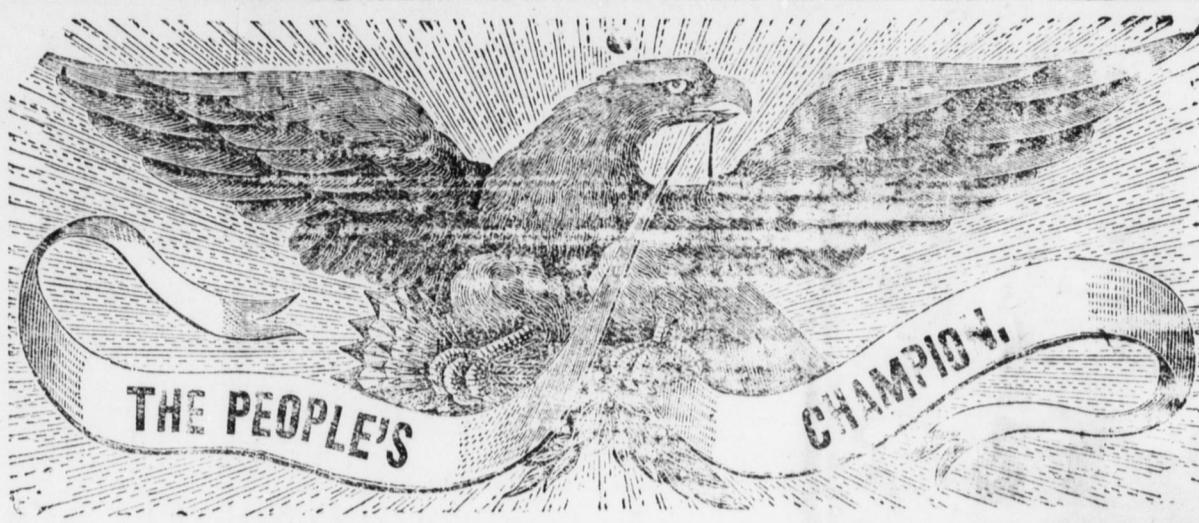
Commissioners met last Monday, full board in attendance.
