

SHOT HIS BROTHER'S HEAD OFF.

A TERRIBLE AEFAR NEAR NETTLE RIDGE, VA., SUNDAY, DECEMBER 24.

News reaches here of a terrible affair near Nettle Ridge, Va., Sunday, December 24, in which Charley DeHart was shot with a breech-loading shot gun and instantly killed by his brother, Buck DeHart. The dead man's head, it is stated, was severed from his body.

The affair was the result of an old grudge between the brothers, which culminated with fatal consequences.

Buck DeHart, the murderer, is now in jail at Stuart, Va., and will be tried for his life at next term of Patrick court.
