

SATURDAY A GREAT DAY

TWO THOUSAND PEOPLE ATTENDED THE OLD SOLDIERS MEETING AND THE BASEBALL GAME--ABOUT 150 EX-CONFEDERATES ATTEND--MANY NEW ONES ENLISTED --DANBURY WINS THE BASEBALL GAME, THE SCORE BEING 3 TO 2 ON THE SEVENTH INNING.

Saturday was a great day at Danbury, the occasion being the annual reunion of the Old Confederate Soldiers, and a match game of baseball between Danbury and Sandy Ridge, two of the crack teams of the county. The crowd in town was estimated at from 2,000 to 2,500. About 150 ex-Confederates were present, among the number being many who were not here at the last year's meeting. These enlisted in the camp, and their names are published elsewhere. It was with general regret that everybody spoke of the absence of Capt. Leak, who could not be present owing to the recent death of his wife. The new members of the camp were enlisted under the direction of Mr. W. W. King, who also put the old soldiers through Hardee's tactics and marched them around the court house and up the street where a good dinner had been prepared for them in the grove near the M. E. Church. Col. M. V. Mabe performed on the old Confederate fife to the amusement of the old soldiers and the crowd. The meeting was a great success. It was regretted that no speaker at all was present, and that no definite program had been arranged for the occasion.

THE BALL GAME.

At one o'clock the ball game between Danbury and Sandy Ridge began. A large crowd, numbering several hundred people were present. At four o'clock the game was ended on the sixth inning, by a dispute over the rules. The score stood as follows:

The features of the game were the fine pitchings of Hutcherson for Sandy Ridge and Shelton for Danbury.

It was generally voted that the playing was as fine as ever seen in Stokes county and everybody regretted that it couldn't be finished.
