It was ordered that each board of assessors appoint one of their members list-taker.

An election was ordered in Pine-needle special school district on May 6, in accordance with legislative act, on the question of levying special tax not to exceed 33 1/3 cents on property and \$1.00 on poll.

J. W. King was appointed registrar and W. L. Culler and V. D. Boles judges.

A petition prepared by C. A. Mickey and others asking for a road in Quaker Gap near Moore's mill was presented. The road was laid out several years ago and the board ordered it opened up and hands assigned.

County Buys New Cross-Index.

An order has been placed for the necessary books for a new cross-index for the Register of Deeds office. The committee, composed of Messrs. N. O. Petree, W. W. King and C. M. Jones, appointed by the Board of Commissioners for that purpose, selected the loose-leaf Burr Patent Index, which is probably the best to be had anywhere. The index will consist of twelve books and will cost \$300.00. They are to be delivered in June.
