property and 38 cents on the poll. D. A. Simmons, court offi-A special levy of 25 cents on the hundred dollars valuation of R. H. R. Blair, painting property was made to pay court house and jail building bonds.

Also a special levy of 6 cents on the hundred dollars was made to supplement the general school Edwards & Broughton,

The same levy was made under Schedules B and C that the State makes.

A special levy of 30 cents on the hundred dollars valuation of property was made in Walnut W. R. Stephens, keeping Cove special school district.

In Pinnacle graded school district a special levy of 30 cents R. J. Petree, jail account was made on the hundred dollars valuation of property.

The special levy of 6 cents for schools was made on the demand L. M. McKenzie, Registrar of the Board of Education. The Supreme court has recently said J. R. Stone, Registrar 1908 that it is the duty of the commissioners to levy sufficient tax to run the schools four months. The amount necessary for this purpose J. S. D. Pulliam, Registrar is \$1677.63.
