STOKES COUNTY FAIR

NOVEMBER 2, 3, 4, 1909

The King People Making Abundant Preparations to Entertain a Big Crowd—Rules and Regulations.

News comes that the proprietors of the Stokes County Fair at King are making big preparations for the most successful fair yet held. The exhibits will be full, the premium lists will be ample, the grounds have been greatly enlarged and all things are being put in readiness for the crowd which is expected to be larger than ever before by thousands.

The following general rules have been adopted by the Fair management, which will be of interest to those expecting to attend:

1. The gates will open for the admission of visitors at 8 o'clock a. m. each day and close at 6 p. m. No persons allowed to remain over night inside the gates, except those in charge of some exhibit or concession.

2. The Association reserves the sole right to settle and determine all matters, questions and differences, concerning any exhibit.

3. Competition in poultry, farm products, live stock, etc., open to Stokes County, N. C. only.

4. All exhibits must be on the fair ground by 10 o'clock A. M. Tuesday, first day of fair. Same must be displayed by exhibitor, under direction of manager of department.

5. All exhibitors must be residents of Stokes County.

6. Every reasonable effort will be made by the Association to protect the property on exhibition from loss or damage, but the Association will not be responsible if loss or damage occur.

7. The Executive Committee reserves the right to withhold premiums in any case in which it shall appear to them that the regulations have not been complied with or that fraud or deception has been practiced or attempted.

8. Exhibitors are requested to place their articles on the grounds on Monday of fair week and the Association will look after the exhibits.

9. In all cases the right is reserved to accept or reject any exhibit.

10. All animals and articles exhibited for premiums must be numbered in the class to which they belong, and the managers shall keep a register of the same.

11. No article exhibited in any department will be allowed to compete for more than one premium. No article entered under head of displays can compete for single premium.

12. Under no circumstances will any freight or express bill be

paid by the Association.
 13. All exhibits entered for competition shall be subject to the control of the manager of the department in which they are exhibited; but the Association will in no case be responsible for loss or any damage that may occur.

14. The Association will not be responsible for any article of any kind or nature that may be lost, damaged or destroyed. Each exhibitor shall be responsible for any injury that may be occasioned to any person whomsoever, by any animal or article exhibited; and each exhibitor shall indemnify the Association against all claims or demands of any kind or nature that may grow out of any injury occasioned by any animal or article exhibited, or that shall arise from the negligence of the person in charge of such exhibit.

15. Drunkenness, quarreling or the use of profane or obscene language will not be allowed on the grounds; nor the presence of fireworks, or any other dangerous material whatever.

16. The decision of an awarding judge or committee shall be final, and no appeal will be considered.

17. No animal will be permitted in the arena, unless entered for competition in the class at the time of being shown.

18. In classes when young stock are shown against older ones, the attention of the judge or awarding committee will be called to the disparity, and due consideration will be given in making the award.

19. The Association reserves the privilege of declaring on premiums or postponing the fair on account of the weather or other sufficient cause.

20. No entrance fees charged in any department, but ten per cent. of all cash premiums retained by the Association.

21. The premiums are designated by ribbons, blue for first, red for second, white for third.

22. When not otherwise specified three judges shall be selected, two of whom shall act, and the third one to act as referee in case of a disagreement.

23. No premiums will be awarded when the exhibit is unworthy though there be no competition.
 24. Any person entering any protest against any award made by any judge or committee, forfeits all rights to any premiums that might be allowed them.

25. The Executive Committee reserves the right to name the number of judges that shall serve in any department.

26. Admission Fees—Adults 25 cents; Children (between 6 and 12 years) 15 cents.

27. No peddling or selling of any kind nor the distribution of hand bills or other advertisements allowed on the grounds and in the buildings without permission from the Manager.
