An Explanation.

The Reporter regrets that in the hurry of going to press with the last issue of the paper, the report of the Walnut Cove fire should have been printed grossly but unintentionally inaccurate. Our information was furnished over the phone at our request by a friend in Walnut Cove, and purported to be an estimate of the losses and the insurance. The phone service being very defective, it was hard to enunciate distinctly or to understand on the wire. However, catching disconnected words and sentences, we are sure that the information was given us as follows:

- That Joyce & Bowles' insurance was \$5,000.
- That Davis & Whitten's insurance was \$500.

We understood our informant to say at first that the insurance on the Joyce & Bowles building had expired, but later he added that some one said it had not and that it could probably be collected. Acting on this supposition, we stated that the building was insured for \$1,500.

The greatest error seems to be in the amount of the Joyce & Bowles stock. We asked our informant the valuation of the stock, and understood him to say \$4,500. While our correspondent probably misunderstood our question, we are quite sure he said \$4,500. We do not for a moment believe that our informant wilfully misstated the facts, but evidently he misunderstood us or we him.

We asked him the amount of the Fulton insurance, but could not understand his reply. We only conjectured that it was covered by insurance.

We did not ask our informant the Davis & Whitten losses on the building. He told us that they saved all but the building, and that the insurance on building and contents was \$500. Our statement that the building was probably worth \$200.00 was only a rough guess, as we did not recall the value of the building, and were under the impression that it was worth about \$200.00, which it was, and more.

The Reporter regrets that the errors occurred. We try to get the facts straight before printing a news article, but it is difficult to always do this, especially when an unsatisfactory phone line is used, and when there is excitement or hurry.

We trust that the blunders have been amended, and that the peculiar circumstances are understood all around. Elsewhere is published a corrected report of the matter.

All the parties concerned in the matter are valued friends and patrons of this paper, and not only by reason of our high estimation of their good will and esteem, but to set the true facts straight to our readers, this explanation was considered necessary.
