Elder Joel G. Southern a few weeks ago was pronounced hopelessly ill of pellagra by some of the most eminent physicians in North Carolina.

Monday last Elder Southern called at the Reporter office while on his way home from filling some Sunday appointments in the Northern section of the county. He appeared to be the picture of health, and carried with him his accustomed air of cheerfulness. In response to the Reporter's questions, Elder Southern stated that he had entirely recovered from pellagra, with which desperate disease he has recently been afflicted. He had been examined by a number of physicians of this county and of Winston-Salem and other places. The symptoms were unmistakable, and Elder Southern's friends never expected to see him well again. He was stricken with pellagra, the new fatal malady.

But the preacher never once lost hope. After passing through the most painful illness, lasting over a period of several months, accompanied by the intense depression of mind incident to the hopeless disease, he at last found himself well again. Elder Southern attributes the almost entire restoration of his health to the power of prayer. He never once lost faith, he says, in his ultimate recovery, constantly praying to this end, while his friends also came in and offered up their peti-

Elder Southern does not believe that either the days of miracles or of answer to prayer are over, but is convinced that the Spirit of God is today as all-powerful as in the days of the Apostles.

Whatever causes may have intervened to bring Elder Southern back to his usual health and buoyant spirits, his many friends are certainly delighted to see the change.
