Never drill peas and waste time cultivating, as cultivation on hilly land does as much harm as the peas will do good. Cultivation causes hilly land to wash, and that is the thing we have to look out for if we ever expect to improve our land. Gullies are always a disgrace.

I find that good plowing pays for peas. Every farmer should have a small hand pea huller and save his own seed. My experience of 15 years is that you can not raise more and better live stock without a balanced ration; and this one comes for almost nothing, for the peas, sown by my method, pay their cost in improvement to the land.
