### HAPPY HOOLIGAN.

Get Busy And Get Rich By Raising Skunks.

Uncle Sam is backing a "skin game." The Department of Agriculture announces:

Raising skunk skins on exclusive skunk "farms" is suggested by the government in a bulletin boosting the "back to the farm" movement. It says there is a profit in black skunk skins.

"Skunk" is the official name given by the Department. It eschews "polecat" and "striped kitty" in telling how to be a boss skunk farmer. How to make a most odorous success of skunk farming is explained in detail in the official bulletin. It says 'antipathy of neighbors' has caused failure in raising skunk in the past. The Department only neglects to tell what uniform a skunk grower should wear and what he should do with his clothes after raising his crop of skunks.

Skunks are natural cannibals, the Department experts say. So skunk farmers are advised to feed the animals meat, and also green corn, clover, bread and tomatoes. Salt should not be given the skunks.

Every 50 skunks should have an acre of ground, the Department bulletin avers. The farm should also be isolated far from neighbors. Wire netting should fence the farm and be buried under ground several feet, with a "hang over" of wire on top to prevent the animals escaping by digging out or crawling over.
