Evangelist In Winston-Salem Preaching Under Difficulties.

"If they think to scare me, they have missed their man. I have been awakened at the dead hour of night to face as many as 30 angry men armed to the teeth, and I've never yet run."

Thus spoke Evangelist W. W. Smith to those who surrounded him on the corner, where he stood yesterday in long coat, silk hat and kid gloves advertising his revival now in progress in West Salem. The strenuous remark came in answer to those citizens who ordered him to drag down his tent and get away, because, as they claim, he is a nuisance in the community, in that he uses indecent language while preaching, especially when he refers to other ministers in Winston-Salem.

FORCED TO MOVE TENT. However, the Rev. Mr. Smith was forced to haul down his tent and move yesterday by the unanimous request of the people who lived on the block where the tent was situated. But the Evangelist didn't move far—

just a block and a half away, where it is said one of those enthusiastic over the revival pulled down the fence in front yard in order that the tent might be put up. The tent is now situated on Green street, and the evangelist says he is as good as doing business at the same old stand, and that the meeting will continue throughout this week and perhaps longer.

"I am praising the Lord, the harder the persecution the greater the meeting," declared the evangelist yesterday. And it is said that one of the prominent citizens of the city went to the preacher yesterday and told him he should not lack for funds to continue his meeting.

TRUSTS MUCH TO CLOTHES.

The evangelist was not daunted in the least by the order of land owners that he remove his tent from Broad street yesterday. He immediately secured the new location, had his force set to work hauling down the tent, and then donned his street clothes—a long Prince Albert, silk beaver and kid gloves, and proceeded to O'Hanlon's corner. He always adorns his lank, dark figure with these clothes when he appears on the crowded streets to advertise his meeting. But when he starts to his tent to preach he puts on his fighting clothes—a shorter coat, soft hat, and leaves his hands gloveless.

The evangelist is being assisted in the meeting by Rev. G. L. Jones, a local evangelist, who has fallen greatly in love with the tent revivalist since he came. Rev. Mr. Jones leads the sing-

ing, assisted by Mrs. Smith at the organ. The local evangelist is a young man and was swept into service by the meeting recently in Southside, when it is said trees were blown down that had never been blown before.
