The petitions were continued indefinitely.

A petition was filed asking for a public road from a point near Wade Mecum leading to the Quaker Gap Road near Covington's Store; continued.

Joe H. Corn was charged with \$550.00 additional solvent credits for taxation for 1912.

After considering several other minor matters the board adjourned.
