THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Appropriation Made For Treatment Of Hook Worm Disease In County—Board Also Appropriates \$300 For Farm Demonstration.

At the regular monthly meeting of the county commissioners here last Monday the Board appropriated \$250.00 for the purpose of carrying on a campaign against hookworm in Stokes county. Dr. Ferrell, who is in charge of the work in this State appeared before the Board and explained the work as it has been carried on in the other counties of this State. The work will be started on or about Nov. 7th, and will continue for a period of 6 weeks. Five stations will be established in the county as follows: Danbury, Walnut Cove, Prestonville, Mt. Olive, and Brown Mt. Dr. Ferrell will visit each of these stations one day in each week for six weeks, and treatment will be given free of cost. Dr. Ferrell is now finishing up the work in Yadkin county where he has treated hundreds of cases. Fifty two per cent. of all persons examined in that county were found to have the disease.

The county commissioners

also made an appropriation of \$300.00 for the continuance of the farm demonstration work in Stokes county. This amount, together with the amount furnished by the New York Education Board, will be sufficient to extend the work over the entire county, it having only been given the southern half of the county the past two years. Mr. L. G. Ross, of Walnut Cove Route 1, is in charge of the demonstration work in this county.

With the exception of a petition for a new road in Snow Creek township, which will be acted on later, these were the only two matters of any importance transacted by the board.

J. M. Fagg Buys Mercantile Business Of C. A. Mitchell, Deceased, At Dillard.

It is learned that the stock of goods and mercantile interests of the late C. A. Mitchell at Dillard has been purchased by J. M. Fagg of Red Shoals, who will continue the business at the same stand. Mr. Fagg is a successful farmer, ex-representative in the legislature from Stokes, and is a nominee on the Republican ticket for county commissioner.

JOINS DEMOCRATS BUYS IN FLORIDA

J. W. EAST QUITS PARTY R. L. NUNN MAKES PURCHASE

Leading Citizen of Walnut Cove and Prominent Progressive Leader. Renounces His Allegiance to the Republicans Forever.

Mr. J. Will East, of Walnut Cove, proprietor of the Golden Rule drugstore, prominent leader in the Bull Moose movement, and one of the best known business men of Walnut Cove, announces that he has severed his connection with the Republican party forever, after having voted that ticket all his life. Mr. East states that he will in the future vote the straight Democratic ticket from President to constable. Mr. East's reasons for taking this pronounced stand are the late actions of the Republican party at Chicago and Charlotte, in excluding a great many honest Republicans from voting in those conventions. Mr. East has recently been prominently identified with the Progressive or Bull Moose movement in this county. He is a young man of the highest personal character, and of considerable property holdings.

Mr. R. L. Nunn, of Westfield, the President of the Stokes County Farmers' Union, and general organizer and lecturer for the Union, has bought something over a hundred acres of land in Florida. Mr. Nunn states that he may possibly move to Florida later, unless Stokes builds roads and otherwise is improved internally.

Mr. Nunn spent Saturday, Sunday and Monday here. Saturday night he organized a lodge of Woodmen of the World in Danbury, several of our citizens joining.
