According to reports Congressman Stedman, of this district, is already being deluged with letters from office-seekers—principally those who want positions as postmasters.

If newspaper reports sent out from Washington are true, Congressman Stedman will name the next postmaster in the first, second and third class in his district. Here is a special from Washington to the Richmond Times-Dispatch which is explanatory:

"From an undeniably reliable source it is learned here that President-Elect Wilson has decided that upon his entry into the White House on March 4 the appointment of all postmasters, with the exception of those under civil service rules, shall be left to the members of the House exclusively. In the selection of such officials, the wishes of the respective House members will be rigidly regarded. Further than this it could not be ascertained from this authority what the President-elect will do towards filling other positions, such as collectors of port, district attorneys and marshals, but it is understood that these large appointments will be left to the dictation of the Senators."

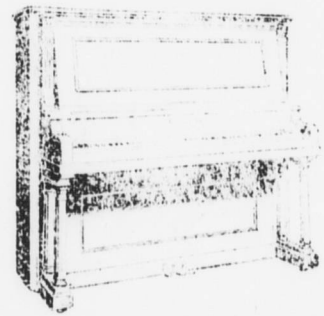
