Order Road Election Held In Yadkin Township.

DATE SET FOR FEB. 17

County Demonstrator Ross Makes Report To Board - Other Matters.

At the regular monthly meeting of the county commissioners here Monday it was ordered that an election be held in Yadkin township, Stokes county, on February 17th, for the purpose of allowing the citizens to vote on the proposition of issuing \$25,000.00 in bonds to build roads in that township. A new registration was ordered and the following registrars and judges were appointed:

King precinct: S. R. Fulp, registrar; G. G. Boles and L. J. Kiser, judges, Fulp's precinct: J. T. Johnson, registrar; D. M. Tuttle and Lennie Pulliam, judges. Pinnacle precinct: J. P. Stone, registrar; W. A. Sullivan and N. T. Pettit, judges. See notice of call of election elsewhere in this issue.

Mr. I. G. Ross, the county farm demonstrator, was before the board and reported the work done so far. On account of the weather very little progress has yet been made.

County Supt. of Health Dr. J. Walter Neal handed in his report for the past year's work.

Some small repairs were ordered made to the steel bridge across Dan river at Buck Island ford. Also the brush and trees on the island just above Clemmons' ford bridge were ordered taken off, lest they injure the bridge during a freshet some time. Mr. L. D. Hole was appointed to do the work.

The bond of D. C. Taylor, who was recently elected constable of Danbury township, was approved and ordered to be recorded.

The Importance of the Mass Meeting To Be Held Saturday.

A GOOD SUGGESTION

Writer Joins Mr. Jones and Dr. Neal In Urging Good Attendance.

Editor Reporter:

We have read with much interest in your last week's issue the call of ex-Sheriff Jones and Dr. Neal for a mass meeting of the citizens of our county on Jan. 11th at Danbury to consider the road question. It seems to me that such a call should interest every citizen in the county.

Our only object in writing about the matter is simply to further impress, if possible, upon the minds of your readers the importance of the step asked to be taken.

No one man in the county can build the roads, and indeed all of us cannot do so without concerted action; and the best way to get such action started is in a mass meeting, where the matter can be freely and fully discussed. But let each and every one who attends the meeting go with the determination that something tangible must be decided upon before leaving Danbury. Some plan should be mapped out upon which early action is to be taken. The idea of having such a meeting and disbanding without reaching some definite conclusion, and deciding upon some definite policy should be foreign to the thought. The time has come for action and we must act.

Whatever plan or plans are adopted at this meeting may not meet with the exact approval of every one. We cannot all get exactly what we want in such a case, but we should be determined to lay aside all selfish interests and formulate some plan, the final result of which will mean the greatest good to the greatest number. It is not our purpose to be dictatorial and such is far from our thought in penning these lines, but we want to suggest that one question should be finally settled at this meeting and that is whether we are to undertake the building of roads for the entire county as a whole or whether the several townships shall undertake it separately.

We join with Dr. Neal and Mr. Jones in urging a good attendance. Especially should each township be well represented.
