Notice of Road Election In Yadkin Township, Stokes County, N. C., Under Chapter 461 of the Public Laws of North Carolina of 1909.

It appearing to the board of county commissioners of Stokes county, N. C., on this the 6th day of January, 1913, that a petition is now on file in the office of the board, signed by one-third of the qualified voters of Yadkin Township, Stokes county, requesting said board to order an election in said township in pursuance of chapter 461 of the public laws of North Carolina, of 1909, for the purpose of ascertaining the will of the qualified voters of said township upon the question of voting an indebtedness of \$25,000.00 upon said township to obtain funds for the improvement of the public roads of said township as will be set forth below:

It is now, in accordance with said act of the General Assembly, and the petition aforesaid:

Ordered by the board of county commissioners of Stokes county, N. C., that an election be held for said township, at all three of the regular election precincts therein, to wit: Boyles, King and Pinnacle, on the 17th day of February, 1913, as near as may be under the general election laws of North Carolina, for the election of members of the General Assembly, to ascertain the will of the qualified voters of said township upon the question of the voting of a bonded indebtedness of \$25,000.00 upon said township, to obtain funds with which to improve the public roads thereof, by "repairing, making, improving, grading and macadamizing," or sand-claying the same.

It is ordered further by the board that an entirely new registration of voters be had for the purpose of said election in said township.

That for the purpose of holding said election, it is further ordered that S. R. Fulp be appointed Registrar for King Precinct and G. G. Boles and L. J. Kiser judges for same; that J. T. Johnson be appointed Registrar for Boyles Precinct, and D. M. Tuttle and Lennie Pulliam judges for same; that J. R. Stone be appointed Registrar for Pinnacle Precinct, and W. A. Sullivan, and N. T. Pettitt judges for same.

That the registration books shall open for registration of voters on Friday the 17th day of January, 1913, and shall close on Saturday, the 8th day of February, 1913. That said registration books be kept open on each day during the time aforesaid, (Sunday excepted), from nine o'clock a. m. until sunset. That on each Saturday during the time aforesaid, the respective Registrars shall attend with their registration books, at their respective precincts for the purpose of registering voters. That Saturday, Feb. 15th, 1913, shall be challenge day.

That those who are in favor of said bond issue shall vote a ticket "For good roads bond issue" and those who oppose the same shall vote a ticket "Against good roads bond issue."

That the Clerk of the Board shall cause notice of this order to be published in the Danbury Reporter for at least thirty days next preceding the election, and also cause the same to be served upon said Registrars and judges, and posted in four public places in said township.
