Sending A Brick By The  
Parcels Post.

**MUCH SICKNESS**

Dance at Stokesburg Friday  
Night—Many Personal Items  
of Interest.

Walnut Cove, N. C., Feb. 25  
—Mr. N. R. Hedgecock, of the  
Hedgecock Brick Company, sent  
by parcels post this morning a  
brick of local manufacture to be  
used in building a brick house  
at Chicago during the City Products Exposition  
which is to be held from  
February 23rd to March 8th.  
This brick will be one of 25,000  
sent by parcels post from every  
brick plant in the United States  
to be used in the construction of  
this house which will be given  
away and re-erected after the  
exposition. The idea was  
originated to test the merits of  
the parcels post system and it is  
certainly a novel one. A record  
will be kept of each brick from  
the time the brick is mailed until  
it is delivered in Chicago in  
order to see how speedily Uncle  
Sam can deliver a brick house  
by mail. It is probable that  
Uncle Sam's mail carriers in  
Chicago will not be overly en-  
thusiastic for this method of de-

livery of a brick house. Other  
mail carriers throughout the  
country will watch the experi-  
ment with interest, fear and  
trembling. While the brick  
fireproof home is becoming more  
and more popular because of its  
permanency, economy and su-  
periority, it is not probable that  
they will be delivered by mail to  
any alarming extent. At any  
rate Hedgecock Brick Co will  
have a brick in the first brick  
house ever sent by mail.
