Oliver, but I am confident that the brother even at his great age does not fully realize the greatness of the subject of good roads as much as he would if he was young or even middle-aged. He talks like people did when they let their hogs run loose in the woods, and when they sent for their neighbors to come and see their big hogs at 100 pounds each, and called tobacco high at 10 cents a pound; and you had to go 5 miles to get to your nearest neighbor's house,

Brother Oliver, we are living in a progressive State. What must Stokes county do? She has her equal part of the State's wealth, she has her share of the undeveloped brains, and is overloaded with muscular men, she is rich with natural resources. Shall we drag along and be ashamed to tell where we are from if we happen to be in Forsyth, our twin sister county, or in Guilford county? We can only say we hope to come up to their standard some day.

We should be ashamed to say that we are not able to build good roads when farm products are selling higher than they have ever sold, and when we don't want to drive a team of horses or mules that cost less than \$500.00 or \$600.00. are riding in good buggies and wearing good clothes. Why are we not able to have a decent road to travel over with our horses and mules? I believe that God holds us responsible for the way we pull them through the mud holes which we call roads.

You are away over there on the railroad and have level land to go to market, but please remember us poor devils who are away over here 10, 20 and 40 miles from Winston, our nearest market, and no road to get there over or anywhere else. Please give us some remedy or go down 3. in your jeans and come across with that that has been there so long, and which these boys and girs need so much to make their lives happy and to make Stokes county the equal of any county in the State, and let us take our places beside Mecklenburg, Guilford and Forsyth, and let us have an inviting place for capital to invest.

I paid \$5,500 for the 220-acre farm I live on and I pay \$24.00 tax on it in Stokes. In Guilford I bought a 125-acre farm for \$6,000 and the tax is \$14.87 there. The cost of good roads is very small when you consider the corn and fodder and wagons they
