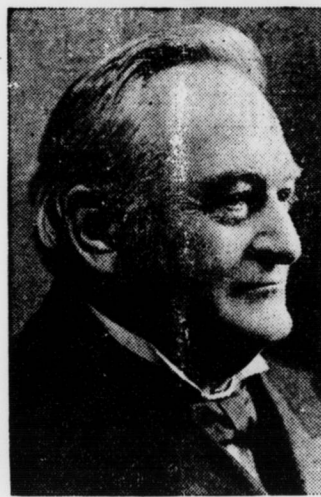

Direct Tax For Roads.

Sandy Ridge, April 7.

Editor Reporter:

I understand that the county commissioners say that they are ready to levy a special tax for working roads in those townships that voted down the bonds, if the people want it. I am informed that the tax rate in Snow Creek will be 66 2-3 cents on property and \$2.00 on the poll, in order to get something like a mile of roads built per year. I write to ask if this is correct, and if so I am against a direct tax, as in this way we would be taxed to death while

we would never get any roads. I was against the bond issue in the last election, because I thought we had better pay as we go. I think the best plan would be to increase the present road duty from six to 10 days per year, and then levy a small tax on property and poll. TAX-PAYER.
