How to Foretell

The Weather

The only sensible, the un-
usually reliable, methods of
knowing what the weather is go-
ing to be are:

1. Getting the official forecast
of the United States Weather
Bureau.

2. Reading the barometer and
noting the wind direction.

3. Observing existing con-
ditions of the weather and draw-
ing inferences based upon ex-
perience.

Each of the methods may, of
course, be used to the exclusion
of, or in conjunction with, either
or both of the others. However,
since the information received
by the Weather Bureau neces-
sarily is limited, and since it is

impracticable to make hourly
forecasts for individual farms
and villages, it manifestly is
best to use, if possible, all three
at the same time: The official
forecast for knowledge of the
type of weather to be expected
on the morrow; the barometer
and wind direction for evidences
of rapid changes, and of what
the weather may be in a very
few hours; and finally the
weather signs, of the kind above
explained, for indications of
what the weather probably will
be during at least the next hour
or two. In short, use the
Weather Bureau, use your bar-
ometer, and use your experience
too. But above all, use your own
good sense and never accept any
forecast that hasn't an intelligible
reason for it.—Chief L. Moore,
of United States Weather Bu-
reau, in The Progressive Farmer.
