STRUCK AT BY A RATTLER

The Narrow Escape of Young Son of Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Baker.

While suckering tobacco one evening last week the young son of Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Baker of Meadows Route 1, had a narrow escape from being bitten by a big vicious rattlesnake. The reptile was coiled under the wide-spreading leaves of a tobacco plant, and was hidden from the view of the boy at work in the field. Sprung quick as lightning, the snake stretched its full length in an effort to bury its fangs in the youth's leg, but only a slight skin-scratch was the result. Calling help from nearby, young Baker soon killed the dangerous reptile. It is quite certain that if the boy had been an inch closer to the snake the consequences would have proved very serious if not fatal.
