Cured Forty-one Barns Of Tobacco.

Mr. Frank E. Petree, a good citizen of Germantown, was in Danbury on business Friday and visited the Reporter office. He reports crops in his section good although tobacco was considerably damaged by the storms some weeks ago. Mr. Petree's crop was injured to the extent of about \$500. Forty-one barns of the weed were saved, however, beside a big corn and wheat crop on his place.

All Previous Records Broken At Reidsville.

Reidsville, Oct. 4. — The Reidsville tobacco market has eclipsed all previous records for the month of September. During the month the four local warehouses sold 1,088,610 pounds for \$158,886.10, an average of practically 15 cents per pound, and practically all the primings saved in this territory and the scrap were included in the total sales.

Mr. C. E. Pyrtle, of Pinnacle, was here Friday on business. Mr. Pyrtle has raised a most excellent and a large crop of tobacco this year. He has not yet marketed any of it.

PRIMING, BEST WAY

The Advantage Over the Old Plan of Cutting the Stalk -- Every Leaf Gets Ripe, and There Is No Waste.

The indications are that in a few years the farmers of Stokes county will entirely abandon the old wasteful plan of cutting tobacco, and adopt wholly the priming method. Our farming readers are invited to read the following:

"By the one method the leaves 'primed' are pulled from the stalk as they ripen, and arranged in the barn at once for curing; by the other method, the leaves are not so removed, but the whole stalk is cut near the ground and suspended in an inverted manner in the curing barn.

"The normal course of ripening of the leaves of the tobacco plant is from the ground up, hence all of the leaves cannot reach the same degree of ripeness at the same time. It is clear therefore, that the method which delays the harvest till the greatest number of best leaves have reached the proper stage of ripeness must of necessity sacrifice many of the bottom and top leaves, the former being overripe and the latter too green for cutting. About the only advantage that we can see in this method of harvesting the crop lies in the saving of labor, but we rather suspect deterioration in the market value of the product will overcome this.

"Not only has the priming method a great advantage over the cutting method, in that it makes it possible for the growers to gather every leaf on every stalk at its best stage of ripeness, but the additional great physiological advantage of securing uniformity in cure, color, weight and quality in the barn.

"The most careful experiments, according to Dr. W. W. Garner, of the United Department of Agriculture, have shown that the picked are about 11 per cent heavier after curing than those cured on the stalk. The above considerations, together with the additional facts that nearly all the highest-priced tobaccos are now being cured by the method of picking the leaves generally known as priming, must point emphatically to the wisdom of this method of harvesting and curing our best tobaccos." — J. L. Burgess, North Carolina Department of Agriculture.

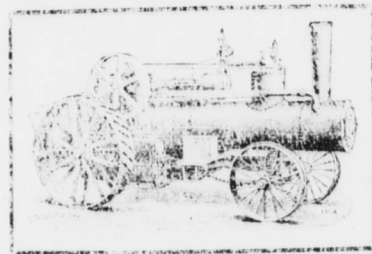
