After the program was carried out delicious ice cream and nabisco wafers were served.

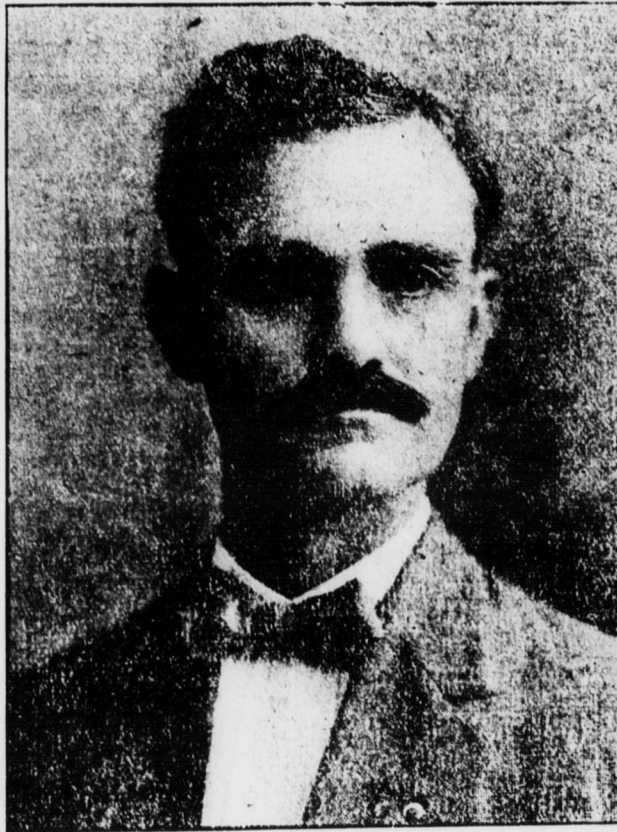
