This law will not only be a blessing in that it will greatly increase the attendance in our schools, but it will reveal in almost every community the very destitute circumstances of many whom should be assisted in one way or another so as to make it possible for them to comply with this new law. Many people will be surprised to find destitution at their doors of which they know little or nothing.
