Miss Tallie Shelton, who has spent the summer with her cousin, Mrs. Kate Mabe, will return to her home in Patrick this week.

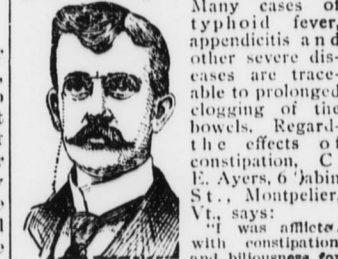
