Floor Will Re-enter Chewing Gum Business.

Frank H. Flee, the man who originated Chiclets, is going back into the chewing gum business, says a special from Thomasville to the Greensboro News. Mr. Flee, who is rated as several times a millionaire, has lived at Thomasville since he sold his business to the American Chiclets Company. In the contract which he made with the buyers was a clause which stipulated that he should not go back into the manufacture of chewing gum for at least five years; the five years have passed now, and Mr. Flee expects to have his business in full blast by the first of May. The plant will be located in Philadelphia.

Mr. Flee would like to bring it South, but the scarcity of labor he employs forbids.

Within the past five years the chewing gum magnate has converted Cedar Lodge, which was a mere hunting box originally, into one of the most magnificent estates in North Carolina. He owns several thousand acres around his house and is now engaged in building roads. Before he quits the entire estate will be criss-crossed with highways of the finest macadam construction, which will cost in the neighborhood of \$40,000.

The owner's re-entry into business will have no effect. It is promised, on the development of his estate here.
