## PUPILS GET "LICKED"

### Mr. G. C. Davis Locked Out Of School House By Youngsters.

## AT WAUGHTOWN

### Warrants Issued Charging Teacher With Cruelty—Trial Held Saturday.

Mr. Gaither C. Davis, who recently removed from Danbury to Winston-Salem, and who is principal of the Waughtown public school, recently had some trouble with a few of his pupils.

Just before the holidays on returning to the school house one day to open school Mr. Davis found himself locked out by some of the youngsters who demanded that he promise to "treat" before they would allow him to open school. Not proposing to be dictated to and outdared by his pupils Mr. Davis proceeded to chastise the whole lot, after which he opened school as usual.

Later five of the pupils swore out warrants against Mr. Davis, charging him with cruelly whipping them, and the case was tried before Justice Lehman at Winston-Salem Saturday, with the result that the defendant was fined one dollar and the cost in each of five cases. However, a council for Mr. Davis claim that he was justifiable in administering the punishment and notice of appeal to the higher court was given.
