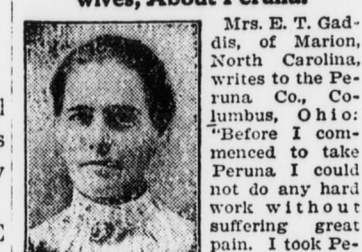
Notice of Sale of Real Estate.
