## WHISKEY CAPTURED MEN CAPTURED HERE

Stokes County Officers Seize One Hundred and Twenty Gallons.

## NEAR CAPELLA AT GREENSBORO 17TH

H. O. Bryant, of Patrick County, Is Found With the Booze and Held Under \$500.00 Bond—Team Escapes.

Stokes county officers on Wednesday night captured one hundred and twenty gallons of whiskey or brandy near Capella, nine miles south-west of Danbury.

A man, giving his name as H. O. Bryant and claiming to be from Patrick county, was found with the booze. He was arrested and carried before Justice of the Peace J. H. Covington, of Capella, who found sufficient evidence against him to bind him over to Superior Court in a bond of \$500.00. This he was unable to give and Deputy Sheriff Tom Watkins brought Bryant to jail here Thursday. He later gave the bond and was released.

The team which hauled the whiskey and was driven by another man was not captured as the whiskey had been unladed in the woods before the officers found it.

The booze was in two large barrels of sixty gallons each, and was turned over to the Federal authorities at Winston-Salem.

Bryant denies knowing anything about the seized whiskey but Deputy Sheriff Watkins stated that the evidence against him was strong and that he found the stopper to one of the barrels in Bryant's pocket.

## PRICES ARE GOOD

Much Tobacco Being Marketed This Week By Farmers.

AVERAGE \$12 TO \$13

Winston-Salem and Walnut Cove Markets Have Good Breaks and Farmers Are Satisfied.

During the past week the Winston-Salem and Walnut Cove tobacco markets have each had good breaks and the prices received for the weed have been generally very satisfactory to the farmers.

At Winston-Salem Monday the total amount of the weed sold was 215,499 pounds and the average price paid for it was \$12.20 per hundred.

The Walnut Cove market sold about 50,000 pounds at about the same average.

All of the buyers for the various companies are now on the market and the prospects for good prices to continue is bright.
