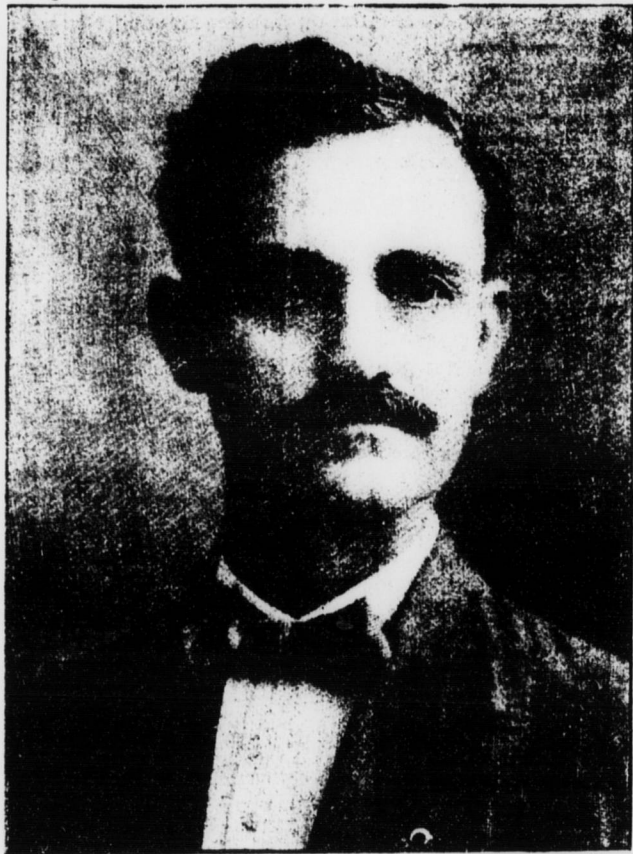


NINETY-FOUR CENTS PER HUNDRED
