

TRIAL HERE THURSDAY

Elbert Kiser Bound Over To Court on Charge of Assault On Lum Booth.

A trial which attracted a considerable number of spectators was held here at the court house Thursday in which Lum Booth was the plaintiff and Elbert Kiser was the defendant. The charge in the warrant was assault with deadly weapon and the case was heard before Justice of the Peace N. A. Martin. The defendant was represented by Attorney N. O. Petree, while Mr. J. W. Hall appeared for the plaintiff. The defendant was bound over to Superior court in a bond of \$50,000.

The trouble between Kiser and Booth arose over a lot of pigs belonging to Kiser which it was charged were allowed run loose and damage Booth's oats and a few days since the two men came to blows over the matter in which Booth was struck on the head by Kiser with an axe. \$21,000 Balance In State Treasury

Raleigh, Dec. 31. Showing an actual available balance of \$21,876 in the State treasury at the close of the fiscal year and an estimated income of \$6,598,930 and \$6,034,971 estimated expenses for the State during the years 1913 and 1914. State Treasurer B. B. Lacy today filed with Governor Craik his biennial report to be transmitted to the Legislature to convene next Wednesday. The Treasurer explained that the balance of \$21,876 shown by the books of the treasury December 31, as examined by the legislative committee, did not include amounts due on the 1914 appropriation for high schools and warrants which were in course of collection, which brought the actual balance down to \$21,876.

In estimating the revenue for the next two years at \$6,598,930 Treasurer Lacy bases his estimates on the record for the past two years and probable increase for the next biennial period. The estimate includes an estimated increase of \$64,000 or more from the counties on corporation taxes for each of the two years, this being the ratio of increase of 1913 over 1912 with much more marked in increase in 1914 over 1913 due to some extent to 1913 dues running over into 1914 for payment. He also figures on small increases from department revenues. He also figures on an increase of fifty million dollars in tax assessment valuation for the next year.
