See Big Boom For Railway Business.

Raleigh, Sept. 25.—As indicating an expectation of considerable increase in the volume of freight to be moved the next few months and a general wave of prosperity in consequence of this, the Public Service Commission, Baltimore, has sent out a general circular to railroads, shippers and consignees of freight to the effect that the present indications are that there will be an unusually heavy movement of car load freight in grains, coal, cement, fertilizer and the like during the fall months and that the railroads

will probably find it difficult to furnish a full supply of cars to meet the demands. And that the interests of all can be best served by the most prompt loading and unloading and handling of cars in order to obtain the maximum service from the available equipment.
