

## BIG ASSOCIATION

The Primitive Baptists Meet at Barnard This Week For a Three-Day Love-Feast.

### NEW SURRY CHURCH.

Will Be No Association in Stokes This Year—Elder Dalton, Prominent Minister of Baltimore, to Preach at Snow Creek 23-24—List of Regular Primitive Appointments in the County.

Mr. P. H. Hall, of Campbell, was in town today, and had his name entered on the Reporter's subscription books, finding it hard to do without the Reporter. Mr. Hall is a loyal Primitive Baptist. He expects to start today for Barnard, a new church in Surry, ten miles east of Mt. Airy, where the Primitive Baptist Association meets tomorrow (Saturday) to be in session for three days inclusive. Mr. Hall says there will be no Association in Stokes this year. Mr. Hall informed the Reporter that Elder Dalton, a big Primitive Baptist divine, from Baltimore, Md., will fill the pulpit at Snow Creek church on October 23-24, the fourth Saturday and Sunday of this month. The services are expected to be attended by a large crowd.

North View—Elders Mabe and Priddy, every second Saturday and Sunday.

Buffalo—Elder Via, every first Saturday and Sunday.

Wilson Elder Fagg, every third Saturday and Sunday.

Appointments could not be given for Volunteer, Toms' Creek and Big Creek, but will be supplied later.

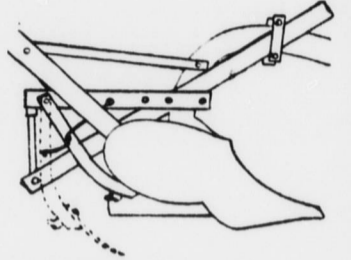

## The Underland Subsoiler.

Patented December 29th, 1914.

The basis of successful farming is subsoiling. No farmer needs to be told of its value. To break up the hard pan and conserve the moisture for the summer's drought with the least labor and horse-power is the question that confronts every progressive farmer. To follow the turning plow



with the separate subsoiler requires an extra team and man. By attaching THE UNDERLAND SUBSOILER to a steel-beam plow (as shown in cut) the extra team and man are saved.

THE UNDERLAND SUBSOILER is simple and practical.

It is a light strong iron frame having a movable foot. The subsoiler can be attached to any steel beam plow in a few minutes without drilling any holes or attaching any clumsy braces. The main bar of the subsoiler extends across the bend of the steel beam, thus strengthening it where the strain comes. The subsoiler fits either right or left hand plows; all parts are interchangeable.

In use the bull tongue extends from three to seven inches below the landslide. It breaks up the subsoil or hard pan, leaving the ground well mixed in the bottom of the furrow. The top soil is not injured by being mixed with the clay from beneath.

When not in use the subsoiler is folded under the mould-board by a slight movement of the foot; it is then completely out of the way. In this position it does not interfere with the regular work of the plow. Both the plow and subsoiler can be used at the same time; or the subsoiler can be used alone, returning in the furrow already made by the turning plow.

If the attachment is used with a turning plow pulled by three or four horses, the ground can be broken to a depth of ten to fifteen inches or even more, depending on the nature of the soil. It will be a boon to the one and two-horse farmers since they can subsoil in the return furrow with the same team that pulled the turning plow. If you have not one make it a point see us.
