The county superintendents will be finishing their work Wednesday afternoon when the 100 boys and girls from the rural schools will come here to give their demonstration. This takes place Wednesday afternoon, November 24, Thursday morning and Thursday afternoon following.

County School Night will be the first feature in which the whole Assembly will take part. This takes place Wednesday night at 8:30 in the City Auditorium and occupies the whole evening.

Dr. Dixon Carroll of Raleigh will make the address of welcome and Superintendent I. C. Griffin of the Marion and McDowell schools responds. Miss Jessie Field, rural and small town specialist, representing the National Board Y. W. C. A. makes the first lecture on the Country School and the Community, and Prof. H. W. Foght of the United States Bureau of Education, gives an illustrated lecture on the part that the modern rural schools of Denmark took in its agriculture regeneration.

The rural schools will not, of course, obstruct the popular school vision, but they will be in its eye all the week.
