#### SHERIFF SANDS FREED OF BLAME


Solicitor Porter Graves and the Rockingham County Commissioners Hold Conference In Regard To Murder Case.

On the strength of this testimony all criminal charges against the officer were dismissed.

Sheriff Sands, with four of his deputies, were charged with shooting to death Albert S. Cook, of Winston-Salem, when the latter, with a friend, was passing through the county with about 60 gallons of liquor on the night of
