J. R. Voss was appointed general tax supervisor for the county and he will also take the list in Sauratown township.

Supervisor Voss expects to call the list-takers together here within a few days and instruct them in regard to the listing of the taxes. Blanks, etc., will be furnished the list-takers at that time and the work will be started about May first.

CONNECT STOKES AND GUILFORD

Forsyth County Will Build the Belews Creek Road Across Corner Of that County Between Here and Greensboro.

Winston-Salem, April 20.—The Forsyth county highway commission decided today to build a mile of road between the Belews Creek and Pine Hall roads, along the south side of the railroad track. Two routes were proposed for a connecting link between the two roads. The northern route was three-quarters of a mile longer than the one selected and would have cost the county approximately \$3,000 more to build. C. M. Miller, county engineer, made a survey of both routes and reported to the board this morning.

Advocates of the route selected say that it will serve more people living in Forsyth county, particularly those of Belews Creek township, than the northern route. Members of the board stated that they felt like the road would be of more service to Forsyth citizens than the northern route, and at the same time thru traffic would not make the difference. The northern route bordered closely on the edge of Stokes county, crossing the corner of Belews Creek township, whereas the route selected goes deeper into the county.

The building of the connecting link between two good roads will cut off about twelve miles of the distance necessary to be traversed between Greensboro and Walnut Cove. Since the building of the link on the Belews Creek road, at Belews Creek, by Forsyth county, and the link in Guilford by that county, traffic came to Belews Creek and around by Walkertown but now it will be possible to go direct to Walnut Cove, leaving Walkertown to the left

ELECTION WAS LEGALLY HELD

This Is Opinion Of Stokes Attorneys In Regard To Vote On Bond Issue For Schools At Walnut Cove.

Walnut Cove, April 24.—It has been reported that on account of some technicality in the holding of the recent election here, opponents of the bond issue for schools would contest the election or seek to have it declared illegal, and stop the issuing of the \$15,000.00 bonds for schools, but in the opinion of at least two of the county's attorneys the election was legally held and there will likely not be a contest.

Much interest is being manifested here in the coming election early in May when new town officials will be named by the voters. This unusual interest comes from the fact that the town is preparing to sell \$100,000.00 bonds for public improvements, and the voters are anxious to put the spending of this money in the hands of their best business men.

M. E. Church To Aid Its Ministers

St. Louis, April 25.—Plans for the raising of a \$10,000,000 endowment fund for superannuated ministers and widows and orphans of ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church South will be presented to each of the thirty-eight annual conferences of the church for approval this year, it was announced today by the board of finance of the church, which concluded a meeting here.

Under the plans, which were adopted by the board, the basis of apportionment will be for each congregation a sum equal to the combined salary of the pastor and presiding elder, the amount

He said that many farmers had an abundance of plants but many others had made a complete failure on account of the cold weather killing them. Mr. Bennett has recently traveled over considerable territory and talked to many farmers and he knows the situation pretty well.
