CONNECT STOKES AND GUILFORD

Forsyth County Will Build the Corner Of that County Between Here and Greensboro.

Winston-Salem, April 20.-The Forsyth county highway commission decided today to build a mile of road between the Belews Creek and Pine Hall roads, along the south side of the railroad track. Two routes were proposed for a connecting link between the two roads. The northern route was three-quarters of a mile longer than the one selected and would have cost the county approximately \$3,000 more to day afternoon. build. C. M.
