To Invoke License Penalties Aug. 1.

While a number of professional licenses required under the Revenue Act of the State have been issued, there are still a vast number of persons liable for this license who have not made applications, according to statements from the office of the Commissioner of Revenue this week. These licenses should have been applied for prior to June 1. Unless applications are received and taxes are paid before August 1, the twenty per cent penalty will be invoked.

Section 96 of the Revenue Act provides in part as follows:

"If after sixty days from the first day of June any person, firm or corporation is found to be carrying on any business or practicing any profession for which a license is required by this act without such license, it shall be the duty of the deputies to demand the immediate payment of the tax, with an additional penalty of twenty per centum (the said penalty not to exceed ten dollars in any one case) as penalty for failure to procure said license before engaging in such business or practicing such profession, as required by this act; and in default of such immediate payment the Commissioner of Revenue shall certify the same to the sheriff of the county in which said delinquent lives or has his place of business, when such sheriff shall have power, and it shall be his duty to levy upon any personalty or real estate owned by such person, firm or corporation, and sell the same for the payment of said tax, penalty, and costs, in the same manner as provided by law for levy and sale of property for collection of other taxes, and if sufficient property is not found it shall be his duty to swear out a warrant before some justice of the peace of his county for the violation of this act."

Mrs. Margaret Lawson Dies Suddenly

Mrs. Margaret Lawson, wife of W. P. Lawson, of the Lawsonville section, died Tuesday at about 12 o'clock suddenly, having previously been in her usual health. Her death was a great shock to the community.

The deceased, who was about 50 years of age, is survived by her husband and ten children, besides her father, three sisters and three brothers.

The interment was held Wednesday at the family burying ground, Elder Watt Tuttle, of Meadows, preaching the funeral. A large crowd was in attendance at the burial services.

TOMMY TILLEY SERIOUSLY INJURED

Cheek Bone Is Broken When Tractor Engine Back-Fires and Crank Hits Him On Head.

Tommy Tilley, the young son of Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Tilley, of Smith, was seriously hurt yesterday while cranking a heavy tractor engine when it back-fired and the crank struck him on the head, breaking his cheek bone and rendering him unconscious for 30 minutes.
