TWO ELECTIONS ARE ORDERED

Danbury-Bennett District To Vote On Consolidation and Special Tax-Walnut Cove District On Bond Issue.

At the regular meeting of the county commissioners Monday elections were ordered in two special school districts of the county, one of these being in the Danbury-Bennett district, for the purpose of allowing the citizens to vote on the question of consolidating the Danbury and Bennett schools and levying a special tax in the district to supplement the school fund. The election will be held on Oct. 20. The other election is to be held on the same day in the Walnut Cove special school tax district for the purpose of voting on a bond issue of \$20,000 to be used for school purposes out for the car and when it was in that district, principally to complete the high school building.
