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MONUMENT FUND FOR CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS

Meeting of Officers and Committees Here Monday—First Contributions Received—Hoped to Raise \$3,000 Without Delay—All Persons Interested Asked to Send in Contributions At Once.

The officers and committees of the Stokes County Confederate Monument Association met here Monday. At 10 o'clock, A. M., quite a crowd had gathered in the court house auditorium, and the meeting was called to order by President, Mrs. R. R. King. The object of the meeting, which was to discuss plans and details of raising the money for the Confederate memorial, was stated briefly by N. E. Pepper. J. D. Humphreys was called to the chair. The Secretary-Treasurer, Miss Mary Taylor, then called the roll of the townships, and the following township managers were found to be present:

Yadkin—Miss Georgia Dalton.

On motion the President was authorized to appoint managers in these townships failing to report, whose managers previously appointed might for any reason be unable to act.

After a brief address in which the worthiness of the cause was heartily endorsed, Mr. J. D. Humphreys, the chairman of the meeting, called for expressions and ideas from the audience. Several interesting talks were made by Rev. R. W. George, Dr. A. G. Jones, Mr. A. Tilley and others. Mr. George was introduced as "Stokes county's biggest tax-payer." He made a talk of several minutes in which a plan for quickly raising the fund proposed was outlined. Mr. George headed the list with a contribution of \$5.00.

Each township manager present was furnished with a blank petition, and instructed to go ahead with soliciting funds and to forward same as often as possible to Miss Mary Taylor, Secretary-Treasurer, at Danbury, N. C., a list of the same to be published regularly in the Danbury Reporter in order to keep up interest and enthusiasm in the movement until the work is finished.

Every person, in or out of the county, everywhere, is cordially invited to send a contribution at once to the Secretary-Treasurer, as it is hoped to erect a monument that will be a credit to the living and dead ex-soldiers, as early as possible. All contributions will be promptly acknowledged, and a list of the same will appear in this paper.

Date Fixed At Meeting Of Tobacco Association At Winston-Salem Held This Week—Four Sales Daily.

Winston-Salem, Sept. 3.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Winston Tobacco Association, held at ten o'clock this morning at the Robert E. Lee Hotel, it was decided to open the warehouses for the fall season on Tuesday, September 25. It was also announced that four sales will be held daily, as was the system last year.

Little business was transacted at the meeting this morning, other than the matter of opening the warehouses.

MUCH BUILDING IN KING

Shore Mercantile Co. Is Enlarging Store—Motor Co. Purchased Old Bank Building—Co-Ops Start Work.

The Shore Mercantile Co. are building an addition to their store building. This new addition will give them 640 feet additional floor space. This will give them all told 7504 feet of floor space. The increasing business of this prosperous concern makes it necessary for them to have larger quarters.

TWO ELECTIONS ARE ORDERED

Danbury-Bennett District To Vote On Consolidation and Special Tax—Walnut Cove District On Bond Issue.

At the regular meeting of the county commissioners Monday elections were ordered in two special school districts of the county, one of these being in the Danbury-Bennett district, for the purpose of allowing the citizens to vote on the question of consolidating the Danbury and Bennett schools and levying a special tax in the district to supplement the school fund. The election will be held on Oct. 20. The other election is to be held on the same day in the Walnut Cove special school tax district for the purpose of voting on a bond issue of \$20,000 to be used for school purposes in that district, principally to complete the high school building. Full particulars of each election appears elsewhere in this paper.

The \$60,000 road bonds recently ordered issued by the Board of County Commissioners, were executed by the board at Monday's meeting, and the money will no doubt soon be available for road work. These bonds are issued under an act of the last Legislature.

The stills which had been captured by Stokes officers for the past several months were cut and destroyed here Monday by order of the commissioners.

DEATH OF MRS. J. R. TILLEY THURSDAY

Passing Of An Excellent Woman At Westfield—Buried Saturday—Large Crowd Of People Attend Funeral.

After an illness of something like a year, Mrs. J. R. Tilley, who was formerly Miss Emma Christian, died at her home three miles north of Westfield, Thursday, Aug. 30, at 4:25 A. M. With her at the last were her husband, J. R. Tilley, and several children, besides her physician, Dr. J. T. Smith, and several friends. Mrs. Tilley, who was 74 years of age, has suffered with an affection of the heart, which finally produced death. The passing was gradual and painless.

The deceased is survived by her husband and eight children, also the following brothers and sister: S. P., N. F. and C. R. Christian and Mrs. J. R. Smith, of Westfield, and J. L. Christian, of Pinnacle.

The interment was at Westfield Baptist church cemetery, Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the presence of a large concourse of people, among whom were relatives and a host of friends from far and near. Services by Revs. Haymore and Olive, the latter pastor of the First Baptist church of Mt. Airy, were conducted in the Baptist church of which the deceased had been a consistent member for many years. Mr. Haymore spoke feelingly of his long acquaintance with the deceased, having officiated as her marriage, and had known her almost since childhood, and he testified to her unusual christian character. Dr. J. T. Smith also gave testimony to the beautiful life that she had closed.

At the grave the last rites were conducted by a Pilot Mt. chapter of the Eastern Star, to which Mrs. Tilley had belonged. This ceremony was very touching as it was administered by a number of the white-robed sisters.

OFFICERS MAKE RICH HAUL HERE

Man and Car With Seventy-Five Gallons Of Whiskey and Brandy Captured Right In Edge Of Danbury.

Glenn Castevens, a young white man of Elkin, driving a Chevrolet roadster in which was tucked away fifty gallons of whiskey and twenty-five gallons of brandy, was arrested on the bridge in the southern edge of Danbury Thursday night. The officers making the arrest were A. A. Hege and C. D. Bryant of the federal prohibition forces.

The officers were on the lookout for the car and when it was seen coming they drove ahead and turned around just in time to come back and meet the car with the whiskey on the bridge. This gave the officers a chance to make an investigation before arresting the man, as he had to back off the bridge to let the officers get by.

The car with the whiskey came from the north, probably from Virginia, and was evidently enroute to Winston-Salem.
