\$2,932,548.66-This District Gets Three Roads At Cost of About \$900,000.

\$50,000,000 FUND TO ADVERTISE STATE

Next Legislature Will Likely Be Asked To Appropriate Funds To Boost Resources Of North Carolina.

Raleigh, Feb. 2.-The East Carolina chamber of commerce announced plans last night by which the legislature will be requested to appropriate \$50,000 annually for the advertising of amount to be divided among the three sections of the state as each section matches dollar for dollar of the state's appropriation.

The fund would be distributed under the supervision of three commissioners, one from each section of the state, under the plan now offered. Details of the plans, it was said, would be worked out later when they were presented to the legislature.
