CONTRACT LET FOR ASBURY SCHOOL

Building Will Cost \$5,984.00—Schools Of County Ordered Opened On Sept. 22nd and Oct. 6th.

At the meeting of the Board of Education held here Monday it was ordered that all schools of the county that run eight months should open Sept. 22nd, and the six-months schools will open Oct. 6th.

A contract was awarded to J. W. Snoddy for the erection of a nice school building at Asbury, in Big Creek township. The contract price for the building was \$5,984.00.

Other business transacted by the Board was of a routine nature.

HARD SURFACE FOR SURRY

Road From Pilot Mt. To Mount Airy Is Among Roads Let To Contract By the State This Week.

Raleigh, Aug. 5.—A million and a half dollars worth of road construction was let to contract by the state highway commission today. The mileage totals 105, distributed among ten construction projects.

Included in the projects are a ten-mile stretch in Buncombe county from North Wilkesboro to Mulberry Gap, a grading job from Cane river to the Tennessee line and ten and one half miles of hard surfacing from Mt. Airy to Pilot Mountain.

JUDGE A. M. STACK AT STATESVILLE

In Iredell Court He Tells Litigants That Life Is Too Short To Fuss Over Rocky Land—Old-Time Revival Needed.

Statesville, Aug. 5.—"Life is too short to fuss with neighbors about a little piece of rocky land," said Judge A. M. Stack this morning, addressing the plaintiff and defendant in a land suit in which property valued at approximately \$125 was involved.

Judge Stack is presiding at the second week of Iredell Superior court for the trial of civil cases. When the case in question was reached on the docket, the presiding officer requested all the jurymen to leave the room. Then he began to ask questions, which revealed the following facts: The persons involved in the controversy are not only neighbors on adjoining lands, but they are kinsmen—a brother on one side is 65 years of age, and a sister on the other side gave her age at 70. It was figured that the strip of land in dispute, situated on the Wilkes county line, contained about five acres, with an estimated value of \$125.

When Judge Stack inquired as to whether the parties involved were all members of the same church, the answer was that the men on both sides were not members of any church, but that the aged sister who had seen the roses of 79 summers, was formerly a Baptist, but they dropped her name from the rolls of that denomination when she allied herself with the Christian Scientists. Judge Stack stated that he was not a Baptist, but still he had great admiration for the oldtime Primitive Baptists, who used to have regular church trials at every monthly meeting and turn out members considered unworthy, according to the Scriptural standard. "What you need is a genuine, oldtime revival of religion in your neighborhood," said his honor, addressing the opposing factions in the case. "Get somebody to hold a revival meeting in the community. Call on Cyclone Mack, he will straighten things out, all right." A smile played over the faces of many in the court room, when the Judge made this statement, but the sentiments were universally approved. One onlooker, who was deeply interested in the sensible and timely sentiments expressed by the occupant of the bench, said afterward that he came near expressing his approval with a loud "amen," but he refrained with the thought that the speaker was not conducting a revival, but holding court.

Judge Stack insisted that in all similar cases a compromise should be reached by the parties concerned and thus save the court costs. "Before I would sue a brother or sister over a little old piece of land," he asserted with firmness. "I would give them half of what I've got—I'd

ALLEN BURTON HELD FOR COURT

Arrested At Distillery Friday By Sheriff Dunlap and Deputies—Gave \$800.00 Bond—Stills and Whiskey Taken.

Allen Burton, a young white man, of Walnut Cove, was arrested at a distillery near Red Shoal ford on Dan river, five miles east of Danbury, Friday evening by Sheriff Dunlap and Deputies Henry Dunlap, Posey Flinchum and Hassel Ashburn. The plant, which was composed of two large copper vessels running into one worm, was in operation when the officers came upon it.

Burton was brought here Friday afternoon and given a preliminary hearing before Justice N. A. Martin, who bound him over to Superior court in a bond of \$1,000.00 and he remained in the county jail until the following day when the bond was signed by friends after it had been reduced to \$800.00.

The two stills were placed in the county jail while about ten gallons of whiskey was poured out.

COUNTY ROAD BONDS SOLD

It was ordered that old road at E. W. Carroll's be discontinued for a distance of 250 feet.

The road at Asbury was ordered built according to the Barber survey.
