OVER 10 MILLION POUNDS TOBACCO

Enormous Sales on the Local Warehouse Floors During Month of October—Average Was Good.

Winston-Salem, Nov. 1.—Almost eleven million pounds of tobacco was sold at the local auction warehouses by the farmers of the Piedmont section during the month of October, according to the monthly report recently compiled by Major Z. T. Bynum, secretary of the Winston Tobacco Board of Trade. The exact figures, according to the report were 10,934,584 pounds, which sold for the splendid sum of \$2,468,048.69 an average price of \$26.57 per hundred pounds.

This average is considered by both the farmers and warehousemen as a splendid average, taking into consideration the fact that a lot of damaged tobacco and thousands of pounds of tobacco of poor quality was sold during the month.

November sales are expected to be fully as heavy as those of the preceding month. It is predicted that the major portion of the crop will be sold by the end of the month and with the splendid prices that are being paid the farmers will lose no time in placing their crop on the market.

Stedman's Majority In Fifth About 14,000

Greensboro, Nov. 5.—Majority for Major Charles M. Stedman for reelection to congress in the fifth district is about fourteen thousand votes, the biggest he ever received. He carried ten counties of the eleven and Stokes only gave a small majority against him.

THE ELECTION IN STOKES

Democrats Win Senator, Representative, Register Deeds and Two Commissioners—Republicans Elect Sheriff, One Commissioner and Surveyor and Coroner—Port Bill Defeated.

The county canvassing board met in Danbury today and tabulated the vote of Tuesday's election in the several precincts of the county with the following result:

Walter W. Carter, Democratic candidate for State Senate, won over H. McGee, Republican, by a majority of 146.

E. C. Gann, Democratic candidate for House of Representatives, was elected over R. T. Pell, Republican, by 27 majority.

J. F. Dunlap, Republican, was re-elected for Sheriff over J. H. Baker by a majority of 83.

The vote of John J. Taylor, Democrat, and J. R. Bowen, Republican, candidates for office of Register of Deeds, was a tie, each candidate receiving 2397 votes. The selection of the incumbent for the office being left to the county election board, a majority of the members voted for Taylor and he was declared elected.

H. H. Williamson and W. S. Hart, Democrats, defeated Ed Slate and Walter George, Republicans, for the office of county commissioners, while J. W. Morefield, Republican, defeated E. F. Stone, Democrat, for the same office. Williamson's majority was 115, Hart's 112, Morefield's 10.

In the vote for president Coolidge beat Davis 171. LaFollette got 45 votes.

Meekins defeated McLean 192 votes.

Carter's majority over Stedman in the county was 98.

Helsabeck defeated McCannless for Coroner 96, while in the vote for Surveyor Shelton beat Mullican 97.

MAJORITY FOR DEMOCRATS HUGE

McLean Carries State By Largest Vote Ever Given Governor Here—Port Bill Is Defeated By Large Vote.

Incomplete returns indicate that A. W. McLean, Democratic candidate for Governor, has defeated his opponent, I. M. Meekins, Republican, by a majority ranging around seventy thousand, the largest vote ever given a candidate for Governor in North Carolina. The other State officers are elected by the Democrats by majorities about the same as McLean's.

Democrats have also made gains in membership both in the House and Senate.

All Democratic Congressmen in the State were elected.

FIFTEEN HIGHWAY PROJECTS LISTED

Last Big Contract Letting Out of Present Bond Issue To Be Held November 26—Stokes Road In Letting.

Raleigh, Nov. 5.—The state highway commission yesterday issued the official list of the fifteen projects to be awarded at the contract letting on November 26 which will be the last large letting from the funds available under the present highway bond issue.

Other small projects will be contracted for at later dates, but no other large list of lettings will be made.

Among the projects to be let is the following for this county:

Project 753 A, Stokes county, grading on 2.37 miles over route 89, from Forsyth county line to northern edge of Walnut Cove.

Almost Too Good To Be True

We learn from the Raleigh Times that Frank Page has proposed a "fool-proof" traffic rule for Raleigh. If it should turn out to be really fool-proof, which we doubt, Raleigh should hasten to put it into effect, then pass it along to other cities. Many "fool-proof" suggestions have been adopted in other lines of risk, and some of them have merited the name, but we have yet to see a fool-proof traffic rule or law. It seems that a man ordinarily considered as having good judgment becomes a nut fool who engages in that sport, when he takes up motoring, and the creation or whatever you may choose to call it, only becomes a bigger fool.

There seems to be something about motoring that robs men and women of their good sense. They will take more unnecessary chances in driving automobiles than they would even think of taking in anything else. They lose all judgment of comparisons; all sense of proprieties, and all regard for fellow-man. We admit that indictment is strong, and doesn't apply to everybody, but it applies to more people than it misses, which justifies it. There seems to be something about an automobile which causes the driver to disregard all rules of care, and make him act as though he were endowed with super-human powers and authority. The awakening from that state of mind generally comes sooner or later, but it usually takes a severe jolt to bring it about. That's why one person in every 10,000 in North Carolina is killed every year by automobile. That means that probably four Durham persons will be killed in automobile accident in the next twelve months.

If Frank Page has really devised a fool-proof traffic rule and it turns out successful in general application in this state, then the citizenship of North Carolina will rise up and call him blessed.
