OVER 10 MILLON POUNDS TOBACCO

Warehouse Floors During Month of October-Average Was Good.

Winston-Salem, Nov. 1 .- Almost eleven million pounds of tobacco was sold at the local auction warehouses by the farmers of the Piedmont section during the month of October, according to the monthly report re-cently compiled by Major Z. T. Bynum, secretary of the Winston Tobacco Board of Trade. The exact figures, according to the report were Dr. R. S.
