CARLOS SMITH GIVEN PAROLE

Judge Grady Recommended Clemency, Blaming Motion Pictures For Harmful Effect.

Raleigh, May 22.—After serving a year of a three-year sentence for improper relations with a girl under 14 years of age, Carlos Smith, young Raleigh man, was paroled by Governor McLean this afternoon following a hearing at which a letter was read from Judge Henry A. Grady recommending clemency and blaming "the so-called censors of the moving picture business" for much of the immorality of today.

Smith was first granted a parole some weeks ago, but a protest from District Solicitor W. F. Evans and members of the girl's family caused the governor to rescind the action, and ordered the boy recommitted to prison pending a second hearing.

Pardon Commissioner Sink today heard both the opponents and proponents of the application, and the governor's action in paroling Smith for the second time was based on the recommendations presented them. In addition to Judge Grady's letter, the parole was advocated by the pastor of the church to which both the boy and girl belonged and by many prominent people of the community.

It was also brought out that the girl is now happily married and living in the state of Virginia.

In recommending the parole, Judge Grady expressed the opinion that the boy had been punished sufficiently. He then commented as follows:

"I believe the so-called censors of the motion picture business for a lot of the sexual perversion that are to be found in this country. The daily increasing rate of prostitution is traceable in a large measure to these immorality pictures we see every night."

"From the evidence I was of the opinion that, and not now, that she had withdrawn in the show certain indications of a lascivious character."
