Drought Hurts Crops Around Madison

Madison, June 24 .- The drought which has prevailed in this section since the second week in May continues unbroken except for light showers. Much tobacco that was planted during the first week of June had died and other crops are showing the effect of the dry weather. Corn is also being seriously affected by the lack of rain and by a worm that is destroying the roots of the stalks, one farmer declaring that at least a third of his crop had died from this cause.
